### 11045-A May 29, 2011 Revelation #37 Eternal Judgment pt 2 Revelation Chapter 20:11-15

#### I. John 3:16-20. Jesus said astounding things about judgment.

- A. The world. Cosmos in John is the rotten system in its broken state. It has already been condemned. In fact it condemns itself by passing laws it does not obey.
- B. The way. God loves the cosmos in a very surprising and specific way—radically self-sacrificially. Rom.8:32
  - 1. "So loved" does not mean "so much" but "in this way"
  - 2. He doesn't lust after it, but has compassion on it. (We actually reverse these)
- C. The wonder (astonishing): the world is perishing under God's judgment, yet he loves it and has given his own Son to save it.
- D. And Jesus said this to Nicodemus—a Bible scholar at the top of his game—who discovered that he too was perishing!!

## Revelation contains the most graphic vision of final judgment in the Bible. It is personal and violent.

#### II. Last week we saw several things about the Final Judgment. Rev. 20:11-15

- A. The description of it. Symbolic of reality beyond our imagination.
  - 1. Not literal fire. Symbolic of a reality that we cannot imagine, but that by analogy may be compared to some sort of endless fire.
- B. The power behind it. God himself, in Christ. Matt. 10:28; Jn. 5:22
  - 1. Wrath is God's settled, permanent, righteous opposition to all evil and sin.
  - 2. There will never be a time when God ceases to oppose evil. He doesn't "get over" his wrath.
- C. The basis of it. Human Deeds. 12
  - 1. Because deeds are the index of the heart.
  - 2. The heart is what needs to be forgiven and transformed.
  - 3. So, hell is a confirmation of man's will to not belong to God.
- D. The experience of it. Eternal Conscious Torment. 10
  - 1. The symbolism indicates an ongoing, eternal reality.
  - 2. A continued state of anger and rebellion against God, even when forced to admit he was right.
    - a) There is sorrow over pain, but no repentance about sin.
    - b) Given over to their desires against God. Rom.1:21-32
- E. The rescue from it: Not our deeds, but Christ's deeds. 2 Cor. 5:21
  - 1. His death and his obedience both put to our account.

#### III. Five important truths that come from the hard news about judgment.

- A. There is a judge and it is not us.
  - 1. There is a judge: Good news because nobody gets away with anything.
  - 2. <u>It's not us</u>: Good news because we don't have to decide the fate of people. I'm free to be loving, truthful, and patient.
  - 3. We can speculate too much about other people's judgment.
    - a) When you trust the Lord with your soul, you are trusting him with everybody's soul.
    - b) 3 ways in which this sort of speculation happens
      - (1) What about the aborigines? (Someone I don't know might not get fair treatment from God.)
        - (a) Really? You know this?
      - (2) What about my friend? (Someone I love might be in hell.)
        - (a) But we do not know that.
      - (3) What about my enemy? (Someone I hate *might not* be in hell.)
        - (a) But we are not in charge. Matt. Mtt.7:1
  - 4. We can speculate too much about our own "rightness."
    - a) Many of us rejoice in our "rightness" "correctness" rather than in our forgivenness.Mtt.7:1; Luke 18:9-14
    - b) There is subtle shift that happens when people rejoice in being right rather than being forgiven. They become judges.
    - c) Discerning is one thing, but perpetual anger over other people's sins is a danger sign that we might be competing with the Lord for his job as final judge.
- B. And there will come a time when we will not be able to hide. (Earth and heaven fled away)
  - 1. We are individually, ultimately alone with God. (see also 2 Cor.5:10)
    - a) What in this world is making me put God off?
      - (1) A relationship? Marriage? Parenting?
      - (2) A business goal? Success?
      - (3) An educational goal?
    - b) There will come a time when nothing matters except our relationship with God. People often come to this realization when something significant in this age collapses, leaving them "godless."
- C. Because Sin is more evil than we think it is. (The just punishment is horrible)
  - 1. The punishment is horrific. Something must be wrong:
    - a) The Bible is wrong to describe this in this way?
    - b) God is wrong to judge in this way?
    - c) We are wrong about our view of sin.
      - (1) It is worse than we thought.
    - d) We are so accustomed to viewing our sin in light of other sin that we don't see it in God's light.

- 2. Sin against an infinitely good person has infinitely bad consequences. Ps 51:4
  - a) If a sniper kills a gangster, that is bad because it is murder.
  - b) If a sniper kills a baby in her stroller, that is worse—why?
  - c) The nature of the victim has an impact on how we view the crime. If the victim is innocent and helpless, the crime is worse.
  - d) God is innocent and all sin leads to killing him.
- 3. Sin is not just breaking rules; it is worshipping something in the creation.
  - a) A good thing that becomes more important to you than God.
  - b) It doesn't start with hatred of God, but with a deep desire for something in the creation: like Eve's desire for the fruit and Adam's desire for Eve.

#### D. And our deeds by themselves can do nothing but condemn us.

- 1. The Bible does not declare the doctrine of final judgment to make people act better. But to stop all acting.
  - a) The worst thing you can do is try to act better instead of repenting.
    - (1) If you achieve it, you will become a Pharisee
    - (2) If you fail (and you probably will) you will become dejected, cynical, and lose your faith in Christ.
- 2. Our bad deeds of course are evil.
  - a) These are the real index of our heart.
- 3. But apart from grace our good deeds are even more dangerous!
  - a) We use them to avoid repenting.
- 4. Many moralistic people try to avoid Jesus by avoiding sin.
  - a) They look good, but their motive is to avoid repentance.
  - b) Stop trying to convince yourself and God that you don't need to repent. 1 Jn.1:8-9.

#### E. But, at the cross God's justice and love meet for us. John 3:16; Rom.8:32

- 1. Not two books of our works to balance out (karma)
  - a) But one book of sacrifice for our sin. The Lamb's Book of Life.
- 2. The slain lamb is where God's love and justice meet. Rom. 3:21-4:8.
  - a) His just wrath was poured out on his own son, the slain lamb, so that his eternal life could be given to you
- 3. This wrath, hell, is what Jesus experienced for us.
  - a) Separation from All the goodness of God and emersion in all the wrath of God on our behalf.
  - b) The God who personally judges all evil is the God who has become one of us and absorbed his own wrath and judgment. Rom 3:21-28.

# IV. The Good News is that God had astonishing compassion on the sinful world and sacrificed his own human life to save us from the wrath we so richly deserve. John 3:16.

A. If we do not respond to this reality, we have nobody to blame but ourselves.
