I. The *closing prayer* of the *closing discourse* of the *closing gospel*.

- A. It is the longest recorded prayer of Jesus.
 - 1. It is God the Son Incarnate, praying to God the Father.
 - a) Thoroughly Trinitarian because of the sharing of the glory from all eternity.
 - 2. Not a teaching on prayer, but an actual prayer.
- B. It is at the end of the last teaching time, the Farewell Discourse.
 - 1. In the upper room, after the institution of the Eucharist and announcement of the New Covenant in his blood.
- C. It is the culmination of the message of redemption for the whole world.
 - 1. From Genesis 3:15 the Bible is about how God takes back his fallen world, judges all sin and evil, and resurrects the creation in new life.
 - 2. It is all about Jesus Messiah, the Son of God. The OT points to him and the NT reveals his person and work.
 - 3. This prayer reaches back to pre-temporal glory, through creation, fall, incarnation, and into death, resurrection/ascension of God the Son Incarnate.
- D. It is all about God's Glory.
 - 1. "glory/glorify" (doxa) used 5 times here. Reciprocal, Father to Son and Son to Father.
 - 2. Glory means to "clothe with splendor," to show the astounding goodness and majesty of God in words and deeds. Creating the impression of awe, praise, worship, obedience.

II. Christ's Prayer for the Glory of the Trinitarian God. 1-5

- A. The hour has come for God to be glorified. 1
 - 1. Father glorifies Son so that Son glorifies Father.
 - 2. Hour: A technical reference to the Cross/Resurrection/Ascension.
 - 3. Everything in the Bible has pointed to this "hour." (12:27)
- B. The Son has the authority of the Father over all flesh. 2
 - 1. The destiny of all humanity is in the Son's divine/human hands now.
 - 2. All humans throughout history and around the globe are under the authority of Jesus. He will be either their judge or their savior.
- C. To give eternal life to the ones the Father gives to Him. 2-3 (Jn.6:44, 65)
 - 1. Eternal life is the personal relationship with God, through Jesus Christ.
 - a) It is *Knowing God*.
 - 2. Gospel faith is a kind of personal/relational/factual knowledge not available in or from the world. (1 Cor.2)
- D. By virtue of His accomplishing the Work the Father gave Him to do. 4
 - 1. Jesus's life and ministry (through death, resurrection, ascension) glorifies God the Father.
 - 2. Note that someone did work for our salvation—the Eternal Son Incarnate did. So that our salvation is not based on our works but on His.
- E. Resulting in the Son Incarnate resuming his eternal Glory—as a risen Human! 5
 - 1. Pre-existent, eternal splendor, Majesty.

III. Are there things in this passage that show us how to glorify God? Yes...

- A. By receiving and resting in the gift of eternal life in Christ—this brings Glory to God.
 - 1. When we believe in God in Christ and express this faith in water baptism—this brings glory to God.
 - 2. We cannot earn eternal life—It is a gift only. Rom.6:23
 - a) From both the Father and the Son.
 - b) The Father gives us to the Son (2,6-7)
 - c) The Son gives us eternal life
 - d) The Father, the Son, and the Spirit receive the glory.
 - 3. We cannot glorify God outside of Christ.
 - a) Human religion and philosophy do not glorify God. They glorify man and/or the creation itself (Rom.1:18-32)
 - 4. Do you want to bring Glory to God? Come to Christ and rest there!

B. By being utterly, increasingly impressed with Jesus Christ—this brings Glory to God.

- 1. Jesus is the image of God (eikon) Col.1:15; the radiance and exact imprint of God's nature in human form (Heb.1:3).
 - a) The Eternal Son Incarnate. Phil.2:5-11; Col.1:15-20; Heb.1:1-3
- 2. The Eternal Son is the archetypical image of God (Imago Dei). Col.1:15
 - a) He was not created in our image—we were created in His.
 - b) We are created in the image of God, the Second Person, the Son.
- 3. When we become Christians we are "re-created" in Christ (Jn.3:3; 2 Cor.5:17), from the inside out, eventually leaving these mortal and sin-soaked old bodies and receiving new, resurrected, redeemed bodies that accurately reflect our new natures. (2 Cor.4:18-5:10; Phil.3:20-21)
- 4. Out of Adam and into Christ, the New, Redeemed, Resurrected humanity. Rom.5:12-21

C. By doing the work that the Father has given us to do—This brings Glory to God. Matt.5:14-16. The various ways of glorifying God fall under one of these headings)

- 1. Learning to think, feel, and live like Jesus. Spirit transformation. Rom.12:1-2.
 - a) When our character reflects Christ, it brings glory to God.
- 2. Living a normal, transformed life under the grace of God. Col.3:17; 1 Thess.4:11
 - a) Salt and Light in this world.
 - b) Good works done to the glory of God. (Eph.2:8-10)
- 3. Lifting our voices in prayer and praise. Col.3:16.
 - a) Vocal: Christians pray and praise together and individually.
- 4. Leaning into the mission of the Lord. Matt.28:18-20
 - a) Be baptized and bring others into the knowledge of God in Christ, missions, witness, etc.
- D. Remember, it is the grace that produces the work, not the other way around. The gift of eternal life produces the fruit of eternal life.
